Poppy	A red flower that grew in the fields after the war. It is now a symbol of remembrance.	     <p> Poppies Wreath Cenotaph War Peace </p>	Remembrance Day is the day when people take time to remember those who lost their lives in the First World War and all the wars since.
War	A state of armed conflict between different countries or different groups within a country.		Remembrance Day is held on 11th November. This is the day the Armistice was signed in 1918, ending the First World Wars.
Peace	A state or period in which there is no war or a war has ended.		Poppies are a symbol of remembrance as they were the first flowers to grow back on the battlefields after the destruction of the war.
Cenotaph	A monument to someone buried elsewhere, especially one commemorating people who died in a war.		Two minutes silence is observed at 11am on the 11th November every year since 1918 as an act of remembrance.
Wreath	An arrangement of flowers, leaves, or stems fastened in a ring and used for laying on a grave.		On Remembrance Day, people visit monuments, wear poppies, sing songs, say prayers and observe two minutes of silence.
Remembrance	The action of remembering something or someone.		
Monument	A statue, building, or other structure erected to commemorate a notable person or event.
